- Central organisation who process all applications for entry to full time higher education (HE) courses in Scotland, England, Wales and Northern Ireland.

 UCAS operate on behalf of all full-time higher education courses at member institutions

 Every applicant will be issued with a UCAS Apply guide. This highlights key information, deadlines and course codes which will allow them to complete their application.





UCAS - Key dates and deadlines

- Now: Through PSE the application process has started
- 3 September: School can start to submit completed applications to UCAS
- 10 September: UCAS Exhibition SEC Glasgow
- 2 October : Music/Drama Courses Conservatoire (Further info. <u>here</u>)
- 15 October: deadline for
 - Medicine, Veterinary, Dentistry
 - Oxford <u>or</u> Cambridge
- 29 January: main deadline
- 28 February: UCAS Extra opens
- 5 July: UCAS Clearing opens

Admissions test *may* need to be completed prior to applying


Application Process

- Requires:

REMEMBER:

Course entry requirements show the MINIMUM grades or Tariff points a Higher Education Institution would expect an applicant to have to even be considered for an offer. If an offer is made, they could ask for higher grades or points.





The Application Process: What UCAS require?

8 Key Sections

Students are asked to complete the following sections online:

- 1. About you personal details
- 2. Work Experience
- 3. Education school/college details, academic qualifications
- 4. Finance and Funding
- 5. Diversity and Inclusion
- 6. Personal Statement 47 lines of text, 4000 characters
- 7. Choices



8. Reference



Personal Statement basics

- 47 lines/4000 characters
- Type in MS Word and paste into UCAS Apply
- No spell check in UCAS
- UCAS uses similarity detection software
- Do not submit your first draft



Personal Statement

Your opportunity to tell the institutions about you:

- Why are you applying? Link academic skills and achievements to course choice
- What your ambitions are when you finish your course.
- What makes you suitable? Skills, knowledge, achievements and experience you have that will help you do well. These could be from education, employment or work experience, or from hobbies, interests and social activities.

Check course listings

see what level of understanding you need to have and what qualifications or skills they're looking for. This way you can link your experiences to the skills and qualities they mention.



The Personal Statement – top tips

- Should be relevant to <u>all</u> your choices
 - Consistency in your choices makes the PS easier to write
- 200 personal statements per admissions tutor per week!
 - Make yours stand out
 NB: SIMILARITY DETECTION TEST
- Write it early:
 - You will need to write a few drafts starting now!!
 - Get someone to read through it
 - Does it make sense?...Does it flow?...Can you say
 'So what?' to anything in it? Have you used evidence to demonstrate your skills etc.

A Suggested Structure

- Paragraph 1 What you are applying for and why you are interested in this area.
- Paragraph 2 What experience, hobbies, interests etc. you have done which would make you ideal for this course
- Paragraph 3 Any other relevant information
- Paragraph 4 Why you should be considered for this course/what future career you can see yourself having.





The Reference – What we include

The UCAS reference includes three structured sections:



Enter a general statement about your school/college/centre.




If applicable, enter any information about extenuating circumstances which may have impacted the applicant's education and achievement.



Outline any other supportive information specific to the applicant and relevant to the course (s) applied for that you think universities/colleges should be aware of.

> UCAS Track



Track will allow your son or daughter to:

- follow the progress of their application online 24/7
- see their choices and personal information
- view their offers
- reply to offers online



Offers: decisions and replies

Admissions tutors can offer interviews and make 3 decisions:



Unconditional Offer: If you already have all required grades.



- Conditional Offer: Offering a place dependent upon successfully meeting academic conditions. These could be expressed in terms of:
- ✓ UCAS Tariff Points
- ✓ Qualification grades/results
- ✓ A mixture of the above



Unsuccessful: The HEI cannot offer you a place.



UCAS Tariff

- The UCAS Tariff is a means of allocating points to post-16 qualifications used for entry to higher education.
- Not all institutions use the Tariff and may use grades instead
- Check carefully entry requirements

It is important to check the entry requirements in the undergraduate prospectus, to find out what credit is given to Advanced Highers for the courses which interest you or what Highers are required for entry.

> Applicant replies

- When applicants have received decisions from ALL choices.
- If you have offers you will be asked to make replies on Track.
- UCAS will send reminders but if you fail to reply by your reply date, your offers will be declined by default!
- Once all decisions are received, you will be able to hold a maximum of 2 offers:
 - Firm (if you meet the conditions you will be placed)
 - Insurance (only comes into play if you are <u>not</u> placed with your Firm choice)

Any other offers must be declined

Next Steps: If left holding no offers

EXTRA

- Operates from 28 Feb to the 4 July
- All applicants are now eligible to use this service if holding no offers
- You can add one more choice at a time via Track

CLEARING

- Operates from July onwards (depending on your status)
- Add one choice at a time via Track
- Clearing vacancy list
- Call HEIs first and get verbal offer(s)



>What your son/daughter should be doing now?

- Research

- Focus on this year's studies

Make sure they read everything carefully that is sent to them.


