

# UCAS - Key dates and deadlines

- Now: Through PSE the application process has started
- 2 September: School can start to submit completed applications to UCAS
- 2 October : Music/Drama Courses Conservatoire (Further info. <u>here</u>)
- 15 October: deadline for
  - Medicine, Veterinary, Dentistry
  - Oxford <u>or</u> Cambridge
- 14 January: Main undergraduate deadline
- 26 February: UCAS Extra opens
- 5 July: UCAS Clearing opens

Admissions test may need to be completed prior to applying


# Application Process

## **REMEMBER:**

Course entry requirements show the MINIMUM grades or Tariff points a Higher Education Institution would expect an applicant to have to even be considered for an offer. If an offer is made, they could ask for higher grades or points.

# **8 Key Sections**

Students are asked to complete the following sections online:

- 1. About you personal details
- 2. Work Experience
- 3. Education school/college details, academic qualifications
- 4. Finance and Funding
- 5. Diversity and Inclusion
- 6. Personal Statement new for 2026 cycle
- 7. Choices

# What's Changing for 2026 entry?



### Format & structure

Move from one long piece of text to a scaffolded approach.

Three sections with question prompts.



### **Character Count**

4000 total character count remains; includes spaces.

Minimum character count of 350 per section.



## Support & advice

Clear links to guidance in the application for students.



# Why is it changing?

Previous UCAS research found 79% of students felt that the process of writing the statement was difficult to complete without support.

The new format will ensure students from all backgrounds better understand the key information universities and colleges want to know about them.

The three sections, each carefully scaffolded with specific, mandatory questions will improve the application experience for all.



# What are the questions?



Why do you want to study this course or subject?



How have your qualifications and studies helped you to prepare for this course or subject?



What else have you done to prepare outside of education, and why are these experiences useful?



# Q1. Why do you want to study this course or subject?

- Opportunity for students to showcase their passion, curiosity, interest, and knowledge of chosen subject area demonstrate why it's a good fit for them and their future ambitions.
- Universities and colleges want to see students have done their research so
  they can be confident this is something the young person will enjoy and excel
  in. This is one place to highlight super-curricular activities as evidence of
  curiosity and interest in the subject outside of the classroom.

## **Examples for this section could include:**

- Personal life experiences e.g. being a carer, the environment where you grew up or lived, an inspirational friend, colleague or family member, a book you read, a news article or blog/vlog, a YouTube video, a podcast, a show you saw.
- An understanding of the area and the qualities you might need to succeed in it.



# Q2. How have your qualifications and studies helped you to prepare for this course or subject?

 This is the chance for students to show evidence of the relevant or transferable skills they've gained and highlight their understanding of how this will help them succeed in this subject area.

# **Examples for this section could include:**

- Specific modules or topics studies
- Essays or projects that explore a particular view point or technique
- School, local, or national competitions
- Private lessons and qualifications e.g. music, stage school or sports if relevant to the course
- Tutoring or mentoring
- Online courses leading to a qualification



# Q3. What else have you done to prepare outside of education, and why are these experiences useful?

This is students' chance to talk about any other activities they have undertaken outside of their formal education or personal experiences which further demonstrate their suitability for the course. This section is likely to be highly personal to them and anything they do include should reflect on why they're including it.

# Some examples for this section:

- Extra-curricular activities
- Volunteering/Work experience
- Personal life experiences e.g. caring for a family member, overcoming a challenge
- Job/employment
- Online learning activities e.g. Springpod, MOOCs etc.
- Trips and visits
- Podcasts, TED talks, documentaries etc.
- Duke of Edinburgh award



## Personal Statement basics

- 4000 characters
- Type in MS Word and paste into UCAS Apply
- No spell check in UCAS
- UCAS uses similarity detection software
- Do not submit your first draft



# The Personal Statement – top tips

## Check course listings

See what level of understanding you need to have and what qualifications or skills they're looking for. This way you can link your experiences to the skills and qualities they mention.

- Should be relevant to <u>all</u> your choices
  - Consistency in your choices makes the PS easier to write
- 200 personal statements per admissions tutor per week!
  - Make yours stand out

- Write it early:
  - You will need to write a few drafts starting now!!
  - Get someone to read through it
  - Does it make sense?...Does it flow?...Can you say
     'So what?' to anything in it? Have you used evidence to demonstrate your skills etc.





## The Reference – What we include

The UCAS reference includes three structured sections:



Enter a general statement about your school/college/centre.




If applicable, enter any information about extenuating circumstances which may have impacted the applicant's education and achievement.



Outline any other supportive information specific to the applicant and relevant to the course (s) applied for that you think universities/colleges should be aware of.

# Offers: decisions and replies

Admissions tutors can offer interviews and make 3 decisions:



Unconditional Offer: If you already have all required grades.



- Conditional Offer: Offering a place dependent upon successfully meeting academic conditions. These could be expressed in terms of:
- ✓ UCAS Tariff Points
- ✓ Qualification grades/results
- ✓ A mixture of the above



Unsuccessful: The HEI cannot offer you a place.



## **UCAS** Tariff

- The UCAS Tariff is a means of allocating points to post-16 qualifications used for entry to higher education.
- Not all institutions use the Tariff and may use grades instead
- Check carefully entry requirements

# > Applicant replies

- When applicants have received decisions from ALL choices.
- If you have offers you will be asked to make replies on Track.
- UCAS will send reminders but if you fail to reply by your reply date, your offers will be declined by default!
- Once all decisions are received, you will be able to hold a maximum of 2 offers:
  - Firm (if you meet the conditions you will be placed)
  - Insurance (only comes into play if you are <u>not</u> placed with your Firm choice)

Any other offers must be declined

# Next Steps: If left holding no offers

#### **EXTRA**

- Operates from 28 Feb to the 4 July
- All applicants are now eligible to use this service if holding no offers
- You can add one more choice at a time via Track

### **CLEARING**

- Operates from July onwards (depending on your status)
- Add one choice at a time via Track
- Clearing vacancy list
- Call HEIs first and get verbal offer(s)


